



FOUR STEPS TO PREP

Emergency Preparedness in Four Steps

If an emergency is affecting the Town
of Hinton, are you prepared?

1. Understand the risks.
2. Make a 72 hr Kit and Emergency Plan.
3. Familiarize yourself with evacuation zones
and muster points at work and at home.
4. Stay informed.



In the event of a major emergency,
PLEASE STAY INDOORS!

Do not evacuate or leave your property or
workplace unless instructed to do so.



1. UNDERSTAND THE RISKS

Do you know the most likely emergency situations to occur in Hinton?

Hinton is surrounded by lush, dense forest which may be susceptible to wildfires. FireSmart activities are carried out each year in order to prevent and protect our Town from fire, but the risk is still present.

Highway 16 is a major thoroughfare for industrial equipment and supplies, both on the highway itself and the railway that runs adjacent. Care and attention is taken to ensure the safe handling of any hazardous materials travelling this route. However, if an unforeseen incident was to occur, it is important to be prepared.

PRESCRIBED BURN



A prescribed burn is a controlled fire designed to reduce the fuel load (brush, debris) in an area and decrease the likelihood of large, uncontrollable wildfires that can threaten Albertans and their communities.

SHELTER IN PLACE



If you are advised to shelter in place, it means remain inside your home or office and protect yourself there. Closing all doors and windows and sealing them with wide tape, closing the fireplace damper and turning off any heating or air conditioning systems will help to keep any fumes out. Next, head to any above-ground room in your home without windows, like a washroom or closet, and monitor radio updates or the Town website for further instructions. You will only be asked to evacuate if it is safe to do so.

2. MAKE A 72 HR KIT AND EMERGENCY PLAN FOR YOU AND YOUR FAMILY.

CREATING A 72 HR KIT

If you had to shelter in place, or if you had to care for your family for a prolonged period without water or power, would you be able to?

Making a 72 hr kit will increase the comfort of the people in your home and decrease the stress and anxiety experienced in an emergency situation. Keep the kit together in a large container or bag in an easily accessible location – and try not to dip into your supplies if you run out of bandaids or spaghetti sauce! Check over your kit once a year to top up or replace supplies.

Here's what you need for a basic kit:

- Water—at least 2 litres of water per person, per day.
- Food—canned (with can opener) or dried food, crackers, energy or granola bars.
- First Aid Kit
- Prescription medications and equipment, infant formula, pain killers, anti-nausea medication, hand sanitizer
- Flashlight and batteries
- Battery or crank operated radio (with extra batteries)
- Candles, matches or lighter, duct tape
- Toiletries, including spare eyeglasses or contacts
- Cash money in smaller bills and change
- Copies of important documents and contact phone numbers
- Change of warm clothing for each person in your home (including footwear), blankets
- A whistle (in case you need to attract attention)
- *A corded phone (to use in a power outage)*

MAKING AN EMERGENCY PLAN

Does your family know what to do if there is an emergency in Hinton? Creating a plan and reviewing it regularly is a good way to prepare. Consider who will pick up your kids if you are unable and where your meeting place is to reunite with loved ones or roommates. Familiarize yourself with fire extinguishers, gas and water valves, floor drains and electrical boxes in your home.

Tip: Make sure you own a crate for your pet in order to transport them in an emergency. Many reception areas will require pets to be crated for their safety and the safety of the people gathered there. Also include pet food and supplies in your 72 hr Kit.

3. FAMILIARIZE YOURSELF WITH YOUR EVACUATION ZONES AND MUSTER POINTS AT WORK AND AT HOME.

In order to avoid confusion or being unnecessarily evacuated, review your evacuation zones for work and home, as well as your children's schools. Follow all instructions from emergency personnel and municipal employees regarding evacuation and preferred major exit routes.

If you are without transportation, gather at the muster point nearest your home or workplace and wait for a Town of Hinton transit bus to take you to a designated reception area. Be sure to dress appropriately for the weather and bring along your 72 hr kit (or a portion of) if possible.



MUSTER POINT

These are designated emergency gathering points located at official transit stops.



IN THE EVENT OF A MAJOR EMERGENCY, PLEASE STAY INDOORS. DO NOT EVACUATE OR LEAVE YOUR PROPERTY OR WORKPLACE UNLESS INSTRUCTED TO DO SO.

STAGES OF EVACUATION

As the authority to order an evacuation can rest with different levels of government (local, provincial, or federal), a three stage evacuation process has been developed and accepted by all levels of government. The process includes:

1

STAGE 1 - EVACUATION ALERT

Residents are advised of the potential need for evacuation. The alert highlights the nature of the danger and that evacuation may be required at any time. Information will be provided at that time on where to go if the evacuation is ordered. Residents should prepare to evacuate and gather personal supplies necessary for several days.

2

STAGE 2 - EVACUATION ORDER

All persons in the affected area are ordered to leave the area and provided again with the information required. Once evacuated you are not permitted to return until the order has been rescinded.

3

STAGE 3 - EVACUATION RESCIND

All persons in the affected area are advised that the emergency is under control and the area has been declared habitable and the evacuation order has been rescinded.

In the event of imminent danger to property or life due to fire or explosion, the local fire department may go straight to an "Evacuation Order" without an alert. This is called a "Tactical Evacuation". Once you are evacuated from your property you will not be able to re-enter until the evacuation order is rescinded. Security will be provided to the evacuation area to ensure no one re-enters until the order is rescinded.
